

Maidstone has a strong, thriving economy which is ready to welcome visitors but is also great fun for the people who live here. It has become the Event Capital of Kent with its wide and varied programme, which runs through all the seasons and offers a great selection of venues. The River Medway, which runs through the town centre, takes you straight out to the countryside along a traffic free, green corridor.

Maidstone has a long and colourful history with famous battles, courageous people and trade being key. Fresh produce, from the Garden of England, travelled from here to London to feed a city of people. Maidstone is particularly famous for paper, print, sweets and gin production.

Mote Park is the largest park in Maidstone with a glorious lake, stunning wildlife and green corridors linking it to the Kent Downs AONB. Beyond this there are many other good parks and wildlife areas worth exploring.

ACTIVE TRAVEL

Getting around on just two wheels or legs gives you the chance to view your journey in a fresh, new way and it might be a lot easier than you think. Why not give it a go for your next commute? It doesn't have to be the whole journey - get off the bus a stop early or park out of town and walk or cycle

Five reasons to walk or cycle:

- Active travel keeps you fit and improves mental health
- Cycling can be quicker and can avoid traffic jams - It reduces pollution and congestion on the roads
- You save money on parking, fuel and gym fees
- Your journey time is more reliable

Think it will take too long? Most people can cycle about 3 miles in 15 minutes.

ROUTE 17

National cycle route 17 extends through the town centre, linking Maidstone with the Medway Towns to the North and Ashford to the South. This route takes you right past the Kent Wildlife Trust visitor centre at Tyland Barn off the A229. You don't have to be a cyclist to use a National Cycle Route – Route 17 is regularly enjoyed by pedestrians as well.

Public rights of way are shown on the map and cyclists are permitted to use bridleways, restricted byways and byways. To report a problem on a right of way go online to **kent.gov.uk** and use the fault reporting tool.





PILGRIMS CYCLE TRAIL

The Pilgrims Cycle Trail runs from Rochester to Canterbury passing the outskirts of Maidstone at Sandling, Bearsted, Hollingbourne, Harrietsham and Lenham. This runs through the AONB of the North Downs, and lining the route you will find interpretation boards explaining the landscape and history, spectacular views and lovely local pubs where you can relax.

RIVER MEDWAY TOW PATH

The brand new River Medway Tow Path runs from Aylesford to East Farleigh, mainly following the watercourse. You are spoilt for choice for cafés along the route, some are immediately adjacent to the river with lovely views and provide interesting places to sit and watch the wildlife or simply enjoy the shade under the weeping willow trees. Beyond the end of this route are some lovely country lanes and places to explore, including the villages of Yalding, Laddingford and Wateringbury.

GETTING AROUND

Maidstone has an excellent public transport network with three train stations, Maidstone East and Maidstone West in the Town Centre and Maidstone Barracks just outside.

Maidstone West Station joins to the Paddock Wood line and there are a number of stations along the route allowing for exploration along the river and return by train for tired legs. From Paddock Wood you can reach Marden, Staplehurst and Headcorn all with great opportunities to explore the countryside of Kent and with downloadable cycle routes.

You can take your bike on any Southeastern train, unless the train arrives or departs London during peak hours - but you can take a fold up bike anytime.
